

This lesson explains how to get set up to begin Discrete Trial Teaching for listener responding and address the appropriate way to arrange the stimuli for a session.



Setting Up a Discrete Trial Teaching Session




Begin by setting up the learning environment. Make sure the area is free from distractions like loud noises, posters, toys, etc. Before you start the session, quickly organize your materials. You should make sure you have your data sheet¹, a pen, and all of the picture cards or objects that you will need for teaching.

Arranging the Stimuli

You will first arrange the instructional stimuli (pictures) in front of the learner. When you place the stimuli in front of the learner, any variable could affect the learner's response. Be careful about the ordering and location of each stimulus because unusual or unintended features can impact responding (e.g., the correct picture happens to be closer or always in the center).




i Note that some advanced learners may benefit from learning with a messy array of stimuli. This is more typical in the natural environment.

Order and Arrangement of Stimuli

You should arrange all three stimuli evenly spaced, in a row, directly in front of the learner. The order of the stimuli is based on their order in the data sheet. For probe 1, cow is in the left column, pig is in the center and dog is on the right, so the order of the stimuli should be cow, pig, dog.




Reminders for Arranging the Stimuli

Remember!

- 1. There must always be three stimuli in the array
- 2. The stimuli must be presented in a neat line in front of the learner
- 3. The stimuli must be in the order from the data sheet




